Annual Meeting Protocol

Standing Rules —

- (1) All persons must be registered before being admitted to the Annual Meeting.
- (2) Identification badges shall be provided for registration at the NSAL Registration Desk.
- (3) Identification badges shall be evident for admission to all NSAL meetings and functions.
- (4) Only delegates (accredited voting members) may present motions and vote, but any member may speak to a question.
- (5) If a delegate must be absent or is unable to serve, the alternate shall assume the duties of the delegate upon proper certification by the Credentials Chair and shall be considered the delegate throughout the annual Meeting.
- (6) A majority of delegates who have been registered as in attendance shall constitute a quorum.
- (7) Main motions shall be written and handed to the Recording Secretary immediately after being proposed.
- (8) When addressing the chair, a member shall rise and state name and chapter.
- (9) Debate shall be limited to two (2) minutes for each speaker and ten (10) minutes each for each question. No member may speak more than twice at the microphone before the preceding speaker has finished.
- (10) The Chair of the Annual Meeting may interrupt proceedings if necessary in the performance of responsibility.



We would like to express our great appreciation to Alicia Klaffky, who was our mentor and guiding light in putting this conference together.




Michael Kahn's work in theatre and opera has been seen on Broadway, Off-Broadway, and in theatres around the United States, in addition to Athens, Cairo, Stratford-upon-Avon, and Adelaide. He has been the Artistic Director of Washington DC's Shakespeare Theatre Company since 1986, where he has directed 64 productions, received 28 awards for his artistry and leadership, and steered the Company to the 2012 Regional Theatre Tony Award. In 1991, he inaugurated the Free For All, which brings an STC production to audiences completely free of charge each year and has reached over 700,000 patrons.

He also created the Academy for Classical Acting, an MFA program in partnership with The George Washington University. Previously Artistic Director of the McCarter Theatre Center, the American Shakespeare Festival, the Acting Company, and Chautauqua Theatre and Conservatory, he was a founding faculty member of the Drama Division of the Juilliard School and served as the Richard Rodgers Director of the Division for 15 years. He has also been on the faculties of New York University and the Circle in the Square Theatre School. Honored by numerous awards, including a Tony Award nomination for *Showboat*, Michael was inducted into the Theater Hall of Fame and was recognized as an Honorary Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (C.B.E.) in 2013.

In addition to serving as one of this year's NSAL Drama Competition Judges, Michael will also critique the contestants during our Master Class. He is a longstanding member of the NSAL Washington DC Chapter Advisory Board. In recognition of his many contributions to the arts, we are proud to name him as this year's NSAL Recipient of the Gold Medal.

Michael Bofshever has sustained a distinguished acting career for over 40 years. He made his stage debut in Al Pacino's *Richard III* for the Theatre Company of Boston and went on to be a founding member of The Actors Producing Company in New York City. His stage career has included The Actors Studio, Circle Repertory Company, The Ensemble Studio Theatre, The Taper Too Festival, and West Coast Jewish Theater, to name only a few.

Michael has an extensive list of guest starring TV roles, most recently on *How To Get Away With Murder, Barry, Scandal, True Blood, The Shield, Private Practice*, and dozens more. He is perhaps best known for his recurring role as Mr. Pinkman on *Breaking Bad*, as well as a series regular on the Disney Channel's *The Jersey* in the role of Larry Lighter. His many film credits include Lasse Hallstorm's *A Dog's Purpose*, Paul Greengrass's *United 93*, Mark Rydell's *Crime of the Century*, and R.J. Daniel Hanna's *Miss Virginia*.

Michael made his directorial and co-writing debut with his award winning short film, *Echo Park Blues*. The film was voted best short at The New York Jazz Film Festival, Film Miami Shorts Fest, Culver City Film Festival, St. Lawrence International Film Festival, and the Best Independents International Film Festival, where he was honored with Best Director. He also received Honorable Mention at the Roma Cinema Doc Fest.

Author of Your Face Looks Familiar...How To Get Ahead as a Working Actor, Michael has taught acting privately for 20 years at USC School of Cinematic Arts, Chapman University, and UCLA Extension. He has spoken on the topic of how to create and maintain an acting career, Journey of the Working Actor, sponsored by the Screen Actors Guild Foundation, at university theater and film programs nationwide. He was profiled in the "Actors Guide to Qualified Acting Coaches-Los Angeles." Michael has moderated discussions for the Screen Actors Guild and major movie studios on the topic of career and craft, with luminary actors, writers and directors in the entertainment field.

Molly Smith has served as Artistic Director of Arena Stage since 1998. Her more than 30 directing credits at Arena Stage include Anything Goes, Sovereignty, Carousel, The Originalist, Fiddler on the Roof, Camp David, Mother Courage and Her Children, Oklahoma!, A Moon for the Misbegotten, My Fair Lady, The Great White Hope, The Music Man, Legacy of Light, The Women of Brewster Place, Cabaret, South Pacific, All My Sons, and How I Learned to Drive. Her directorial work has also been seen Off-Broadway at 59E59 in New York, Portland Center Stage, Canada's Shaw Festival, The Court Theatre, The Old Globe, Asolo Repertory, Berkeley Repertory, Trinity Repertory, Toronto's Tarragon Theatre, Montreal's Centaur Theatre, and Perseverance Theater in Juneau, Alaska, which she founded and ran from 1979 to 1998.

Molly has been a leader in new play development for over 40 years. She is a great believer in first, second, and third productions of new work and has championed projects including *How I Learned to Drive*; *Passion Play, a cycle*; *Next to Normal*; and *Dear Evan Hansen*.

She led the re-invention of Arena Stage, focusing on the architecture and creation of the Mead Center for American Theater and positioning Arena Stage as a national center for American artists. During her time with the company, Arena Stage has workshopped more than 100 productions, produced 39 world premieres, staged numerous second and third productions, and been an important part of nurturing nine projects that went on to have a life on Broadway. In 2014, Molly made her Broadway debut directing *The Velocity of Autumn*, following its critically acclaimed run at Arena Stage. She was awarded honorary doctorates from American University and Towson University. In 2018, she was honored as Person of the Year by the National Theatre Conference and inducted into the Washington DC Hall of Fame.

Geoffrey Soffer joined Actors Equity at the age of 11 and has been working in the entertainment industry ever since. After studying musical theater at the University of Cincinnati, he was inspired to pursue an internship in casting at Roundabout Theater Company, which led to several years in artistic development and casting of Broadway, Off-Broadway, and regional plays and musicals. He then joined Disney-ABC and spent nearly a decade casting primetime television shows, most notably the acclaimed series *Ugly Betty*.

In 2012, Geoffrey launched Soffer/Namoff Entertainment with a mission to develop and nurture the next generation of fearless artists, and to produce adventurous stage and screen productions. Credits include the Broadway revival of *Fiddler on the Roof* directed by Bartlett Sher, the film adaptation of Jason Robert Brown's musical *The Last Five Years* directed by Richard LaGravenese, and both the indie comedy *He's Way More Famous Than You* and the digital series *Whats Your Emergency* with collaborators Michael Urie, Halley Feiffer, and Ryan Spahn. Geoffrey was an adjunct professor at Pace University and teaches in actor training programs throughout the country.





Robert C. Pullen is the Executive Director of Nouveau Productions, a full-service production and events company specializing in live events. An Emmy[™] nominated Producer with more than 24 years of experience, Robert has also been executive producer of Special Events at Lincoln Center since 2016. Career highlights include *President Obama's 2009 Inaugural Swearing-In Ceremony* (Aretha Franklin segment) and *9/11: Ten Years Later* (broadcast worldwide on Facebook) with the Hon. Condoleezza Rice, the Hon. Madeleine Albright, and the Hon. Colin Powell.

He was Executive Producer of the *David Rubenstein Series: Profiles in Creativity* for the Kennedy Center and *President Kennedy Remembered: JFK 50th Anniversary* with Yo-Yo Ma, Paul Simon, and Lorne Michaels. Television credits include the *Mark Twain Prize for American Humor* on PBS for 11 years, including Will Ferrell, Tina Fey, Lily Tomlin, Ellen DeGeneres, Steve Martin, Billy Crystal, Whoopi Goldberg, and most recently Carol Burnett.

Robert graduated from The American Musical and Dramatic Academy in New York City, studying musical theater performance, and he attended The Juilliard School for voice and piano.





It All Began on Newlands Street!

On a warm summer day in 1944, Mollie Davis Nicholson and Francesca Falk Miller Nielsen sat in rocking chairs on Mollie's front porch in Chevy Chase, north of Washington DC, and talked about the state of the arts. They discussed the fact that the arts received very little support in this country, in contrast to the government subsidies given to artists in European countries. They decided to do something about it, and that afternoon the National Society of Arts and Letters was conceived. It was to be a nonpartisan, non-political, and non-profit organization. Their plan was to provide financial assistance to promising young artists through scholarships in the artistic disciplines of art, music, and literature.

And so on September 2, 1944, at 103 Newlands Street, Chevy Chase, Mollie Davis Nicholson and her daughter, Dorothy Nicholson Bates (later Dorothy Nicholson Stabell), Francesca Nielsen, and a few other women, founded the National Society of Arts and Letters. Mollie agreed to grow the first chapter, to be called the Chevy Chase Chapter. In March 1945, it changed its name to the Washington Chapter when one of the founding members, Eleanor Searle Whitney, moved to Georgetown, a Washington neighborhood. Francesca started the Chicago Chapter in October 1944.

After starting the Chicago Chapter, Francesca took NSAL national, traveling the country opening chapters in other cities. In addition to her NSAL efforts, Francesca was also a singer, author, and a poet, as well as President of the Friends of the Chicago Library.

By June 30, 1945, the first NSAL national conference was held in Chicago. There were already eight chapters formed:

Washington DC, Chicago, Florida, Colorado, North Dakota, California, Texas, and Kentucky. The conference concerned itself with rewriting the bylaws, establishing uniform guidelines for scholarships, and defining the purpose of NSAL. Young artists were to be encouraged by donor gifts, chapter prizes, scholarships, and exhibitions of their work. The bylaws provided membership to women qualified in the arts who were U.S. citizens. Artist member Emma W. Slack designed the logo.


In 1945, under the leadership of Mollie and Francesca, the Washington and Chicago Chapters awarded their first scholarships. Both chapters awarded a scholarship in piano, the Washington Chapter awarded three in voice, and the Chicago Chapter awarded one in pipe organ.

By 1946, there were four more chapters: Arkansas, Indiana, Ohio, and New Jersey. A convention was held in Washington DC from April 15-16 at the Mayflower Hotel. The convention theme was "Talent is Essential for Peace." The program stated: "It has been said that a nation is as great as its cultural standards. The National Society of Arts and Letters is an organization whose broader purpose is to promote lasting world peace by lifting standards of every nation through mutual appreciation and endeavor in intellectual and cultural fields. Our immediate purpose is to aid young talent to receive recognition in the fields of art, music and literature."

It was a wonderful convention. First Lady Bess Truman initiated the festivities with a reception at the White

House. On April 16, 1946, the *Washington Post* covered the event, stating: "The Nation's Capital has long been accustomed to brilliant and talented women, but even Washingtonians must perk up with interest at the varied accomplishments of the women composing a new organization — The National Society of Arts and Letters."

At this 1946 convention, a group of distinguished persons in the arts was named to an NSAL Advisory Council. Practical matters were also addressed. It was decided to have a national initiation fee and national dues. There were even hopes of building a national clubhouse. Chapters were encouraged to hold annual benefits and gather scholarship funds.

As growth continued, Francesca, the second National President, introduced and edited the newsletter with a plan to issue it three times a year. A Certificate of Incorporation was issued July 29, 1949, and tax-exempt status was recorded November 7, 1949. That year the dance and drama categories were added to the list of artistic disciplines. By 1951, NSAL had 25 chapters.

Mollie was an inspirational, natural leader who was also deeply involved in politics. She was the first Democratic

National Committeewoman from Maryland to attend the 1924 National Democratic Convention in New York City and was considered as a possible Vice Presidential candidate. In 1941, she ran as a candidate for Congress. She was President of the Chevy Chase Branch of the Montgomery County Chapter of the American Red Cross, raising more money during World War I than any other branch in Maryland. Mollie was presented with a service medal by the American Red Cross and continued her work through World War II.

Mollie was also Regent of Chevy Chase of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution. She used her skills to organize four thrift shops in the area that raised funds to feed milk and lunch to county school children.
